1. (10pts)

A) (2pt) Write a one-dimensional wave equation for a scalar field, $\psi(x, t)$ propagating in a medium with wave velocity v . Show by explicit calculation that

$$\psi(x, t) = B(x + vt)$$

where B is a differentiable but otherwise arbitrary function, is an exact solution to the wave equation. Specify the direction in which this solution propagates.

$$\frac{\partial^2 \psi}{\partial x^2} - \frac{1}{v^2} \frac{\partial^2 \psi}{\partial t^2} = 0 \quad \psi(x, t) = B(x + vt) \Rightarrow \begin{cases} \frac{\partial^2 B(x+vt)}{\partial x^2} = B''(x+vt) \\ \frac{\partial^2 B(x+vt)}{\partial t^2} = (v)^2 B''(x+vt) \end{cases}$$

$$\Rightarrow \frac{\partial^2 \psi}{\partial x^2} - \frac{1}{v^2} \frac{\partial^2 \psi}{\partial t^2} = 0$$

B) (4pt) A three-dimensional vector field is specified by the following function:

$$\vec{A} = \frac{(\hat{j} + \hat{k})}{\sqrt{2}} A_0 \exp \left[i \frac{2\pi}{\sqrt{2}} (-y + z) \times 10^6 - i 6\pi \times 10^{14} t \right]$$

where y, z are in meters, and t is in seconds. Specify:

- 1) the propagation vector (wave-vector) $\vec{k}$
- 2) the wavelength
- 3) the velocity of propagation

$$\begin{aligned} 1) \vec{k} &= \frac{2\pi \cdot 10^6}{\sqrt{2}} (0, -1, 1) \\ 2) |\vec{k}| &= \frac{2\pi}{\lambda} \quad |\vec{k}| = 2\pi \cdot 10^6 \Rightarrow \lambda = 1 \mu\text{m} \\ 3) \omega &= 6\pi \cdot 10^{14} = |\vec{k}| v \Rightarrow v = \frac{6\pi \cdot 10^{14}}{2\pi \cdot 10^6} = 3 \times 10^8 \text{ m/s} \end{aligned}$$

C) (2pt) Calculate the divergence of this vector field. Decide if $\vec{A}$ could represent magnetic or electric field in a light wave.

$$\nabla \cdot \vec{A} = i \vec{k} \cdot \vec{A} = i \frac{(\hat{j} + \hat{k})}{\sqrt{2}} \cdot (\hat{k} - \hat{j}) A_0 \exp(\dots) = 0$$

YES, it could

D) (2pt) Determine the direction of $\nabla \times \vec{A}$. It is not necessary to calculate its magnitude. You may want to make use of the operator equivalencies discussed in the class.

$$\nabla \times \vec{A} \sim \vec{k} \times \vec{A} \sim (\hat{k} - \hat{j}) \times (\hat{j} + \hat{k}) \sim \hat{i}$$

the direction is along $\underline{x}$

2. (10pts) Consider Maxwell equations in a non-magnetic, dielectric medium with permittivity ϵ .

A) (2pt) Write the relation between the displacement field $\vec{D}$ and the electric field $\vec{E}$. What are the SI unit of $\vec{E}$ and $\vec{D}$? (Express units in terms of V and A, no need to convert to base units.)

$$\vec{D} = \epsilon_0 \epsilon_r \vec{E} \quad [E] = V/m \quad [D] = As/m^2$$

$$\text{check: } [D] = [\epsilon_0] [E] = \frac{F}{m} \frac{V}{m} = \frac{As}{Vm} \frac{V}{m} = \frac{As}{m^2}$$

B) (4pt) Write the Ampere and Faraday laws in the differential form explicitly, writing out all vector components (do not use operator ∇ , your answer must be in terms of $E_x, E_y, \dots B_x, B_y, \dots$).

$$\nabla \times \vec{H} = \partial_t \vec{D} \quad \nabla \times \vec{E} = -\partial_t \vec{B}$$

$$\begin{aligned} x: \partial_y H_z - \partial_z H_y &= \partial_t D_x & x: \partial_y E_z - \partial_z E_y &= -\partial_t B_x \\ y: \partial_z H_x - \partial_x H_z &= \partial_t D_y & y: \partial_z E_x - \partial_x E_z &= -\partial_t B_y \\ z: \partial_x H_y - \partial_y H_x &= \partial_t D_z & z: \partial_x E_y - \partial_y E_x &= -\partial_t B_z \end{aligned}$$

C) (1pt) Write the electric Gauss law in the explicit component form.

$$\nabla \cdot \vec{D} = \rho = \frac{\partial D_x}{\partial x} + \frac{\partial D_y}{\partial y} + \frac{\partial D_z}{\partial z} \quad \nabla \cdot \vec{B} = 0 \quad \frac{\partial B_x}{\partial x} + \frac{\partial B_y}{\partial y} + \frac{\partial B_z}{\partial z} = 0$$

D) (3pt) For the electric field given by the formula (standing wave)

$$\vec{E} = E_0 \hat{j} \cos[kx] \cos[\omega t],$$

calculate the magnetic field $\vec{B}$ by integrating the equation obtained from the Faraday law.

$$\nabla \times \vec{E} = -\partial_t \vec{B}$$

$$-\partial_t B_z = (\nabla \times \vec{E})_z = \partial_x E_y - \partial_y E_x = \partial_x E_y = E_0 (-k) \sin(kx) \cos(\omega t)$$

$$B_z = -(-k) E_0 \sin(kx) \frac{\sin(\omega t)}{\omega} = \frac{\omega}{c} \frac{1}{\omega} E_0 \sin(kx) \sin(\omega t)$$

$$\vec{B} = \frac{1}{c} E_0 \sin(kx) \sin(\omega t) \hat{z}$$

3. (10pts) This problem is about harmonic plane-wave solutions to the Maxwell equations. Consider a plane-wave propagating in the direction of a unit vector $\hat{n} = \alpha\hat{i} + \alpha\hat{k}$, where $\alpha = 1/\sqrt{2}$. The plane of polarization of the electric field is the plane $x-z$. The irradiance of this plane wave is $I = 10^6 \text{ W/m}^2$, and the wavelength is $\lambda = 400 \text{ nm}$. Relative permittivity of the medium is $\epsilon_r = 2$,

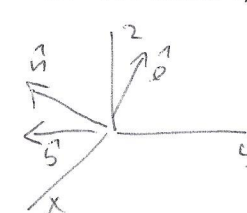
A) (1pt) What is the polarization vector $\hat{e}$ (i.e. direction of oscillation) of the electric field?

$$\hat{e} \perp \hat{n} \Rightarrow \hat{e} = (-\frac{1}{\sqrt{2}}\hat{i} + \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}}\hat{k})$$

B) (2pt) Determine the electric field amplitude E_0 .

$$I = \frac{1}{2} \epsilon_0 c n E^2 \quad (n = \sqrt{\epsilon_r} = \sqrt{2}) \Rightarrow E_0 = \sqrt{\frac{2I}{\epsilon_0 c \sqrt{2}}}$$

C) (2pt) What is the magnetic field amplitude $\vec{B}_0$ in this wave? What direction it has? Use either ϵ_r or refractive index in your answer.

$$\vec{B}_0 = \frac{n \vec{E}_0}{c} \quad \hat{b} \perp \hat{e} \ \& \ \hat{b} \perp \hat{n} \Rightarrow \hat{b} = \pm \hat{j} \quad \boxed{\hat{b} = -\hat{j}}$$


C) (3pt) Give the expression for the energy density of an electromagnetic field, and show that the magnetic and electric parts of the energy density are equal for this plane wave.

$$U = \frac{\epsilon_0}{2} E^2 + \frac{1}{2\mu_0} B^2 = \frac{\epsilon_0}{2} E^2 + \frac{1}{2\mu_0} \frac{n^2 E^2}{c^2} = \frac{\epsilon_0}{2} E^2 + \frac{1}{2}$$

D) (1pt) Specify the time-averaged Poynting vector $\langle \vec{S} \rangle_T$.

$$\langle \vec{S} \rangle_T = I \hat{n}$$

$\uparrow$
direction

E) (1pt) Specify the Poynting vector $\vec{S}(x, y, z, t)$ for this plane wave. You should not need to calculate electric and magnetic fields to answer this question.

$$\vec{S} = 2I \hat{n} \cos^2\left(\frac{2\pi}{\lambda} \hat{n} \cdot \vec{r} - \frac{2\pi c}{\lambda} t + \phi\right)$$

4. (10pts) Gaussian beam has power $P = 10\text{W}$, and the maximal intensity $I_0 = 5 \times 10^{10}\text{W/m}^2$. It propagates along the z -axis, and the point of the maximal intensity is at the origin of the Cartesian coordinate system. The wavelength is $\lambda = 1.3\mu\text{m}$.

A) (1pt) Calculate the waist w_0 of this beam.

$$A = \frac{\pi w_0^2}{2} \quad P = I_0 A \Rightarrow \frac{\pi w_0^2}{2} = \frac{P}{I_0} \Rightarrow w_0 = \sqrt{\frac{2P}{\pi I_0}}$$

B) (2pt) Calculate the Rayleigh range and explain its physical meaning.

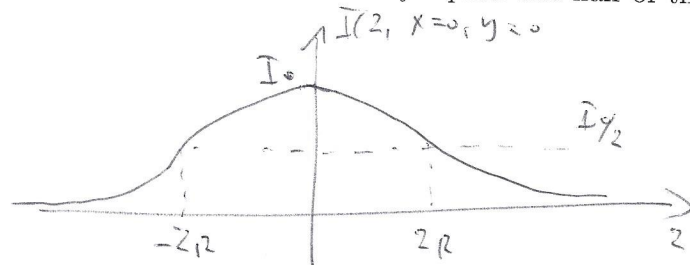
$$z_R = \frac{\pi w_0^2}{\lambda} \quad I \rightarrow I_0/2 \text{ at } z_R$$

$$w(z) \rightarrow \sqrt{2} w_0 \text{ at } z_R$$

C) (2pt) Calculate the beam spot size at the distance of ten times Rayleigh range.

$$w(z) = w_0 \sqrt{1 + \left(\frac{z}{z_R}\right)^2} = w_0 \sqrt{101} \approx w_0 \cdot 10$$

D) (1pt) Make a sketch of $I(x=0, y=0, z)$, i.e. the on-axis intensity versus propagation distance, find out the points at which the intensity equals one half of the maximal, and mark them in your sketch.



E) (2pt) Give the energy of a single photon, and calculate the total photon flux (i.e. number of photons per second) in this beam.

$$E_{ph} = \hbar \omega \quad \phi E_{ph} = P \Rightarrow \phi = \frac{P}{E_{ph}} \quad \phi = \frac{P}{\hbar \omega} \sim \frac{10}{10^{-3} \cdot 10^{15}} \sim 10^{19} - 10^{20}$$

F) (2pt) Calculate the force this beam exerts on a perfectly absorbing object. What is the force on a perfect mirror at normal incidence?

$$F = P/c \quad \text{check units: } \frac{\text{Js}}{\text{s m}} = \frac{\text{N m s}}{\text{s m}} = \text{N} \checkmark$$

$$\text{Mirror: } F = 2 \times \frac{P}{c}$$

↑ twice change of momentum in each photon

$$\text{OR: } F \cdot \Delta t = \Delta \text{momentum} = \hbar k \cdot \phi = \frac{\hbar k P}{\hbar \omega} = \frac{k P}{\omega} = \frac{P}{c} \checkmark$$
